Vancouver Train Expo 2024 Report

Vancouver Train Expo 2024 was a great success with 6,380 attending, essentially matching that of 2019, the highest of the 39 shows since the inception of the public train show.

Setting up the venue went almost flawlessly from the beginning with suppliers arriving on schedule and the entry of exhibitors and vendors completed early.

The electronic admissions payment system worked extremely well. Ticketleader (PNE) promotion appears to have made a significant contribution, with sales representing 33 percent of admissions. Similarly, vacating the venue on Sunday went very well, being largely complete in less than two hours.

Of interest, 49 and 36 percent of admissions revenue came via electronic and Ticketleader sales respectively, with the remaining 15 percent via cash. Times have changed since the all cash days pre-2017, the first year using an electronic payment system.

Saturday ended on a bit of an ominous note with attendance of 2,850. On only two occasions out of six since moving to the PNE, in 2016 and 2017, has Sunday's attendance exceeded Saturday's. The event needed 5,000 to break even financially. It looked like 2024 was headed for break even at best, a disappointing prospect given the effort put into promotion this year. Fortunately, Sunday came through with attendance of 3,530, for a total of 6,380, essentially matching the best year ever, that of 6,400 in 2019.

The event did very well financially. The combination of 2023's admission price increase and attendance of 6,380 resulted in the best financial performance ever. The increased revenue will allow the working capital reserve for future events to increase. It will no longer be necessary to borrow funds to finance the event. Exhibitors will receive an increased honorarium in recognition of their contribution to the success of the event.

There were some challenges along the way. The number of exhibitors and vendors interested in participating seems to be declining. Although the venue was pretty much filled, the uptake of premium booths, regular tables and exhibit floor space all presented challenges. The rate new exhibitors and vendors arrive is failing to keep up with the rate previous exhibitors and vendors drop out.

Two booths went underutilized and three more were used for exhibit space which could have been accommodated in the main exhibit floor. On October 12th and 23rd there were 8 and 3 unsold Marketplace tables respectively. In the end all 59 Marketplace tables were sold but there was no wait list. Filling the venue, especially with family friendly exhibits, will be an ongoing concern as the modelling community ages.

Family and children oriented exhibits are critical to the success of the event. There are simply not enough model railroad aficionados to support the event on this scale. On that front, Tom Stephenson was able to make the trip north from Seattle with his wTrak modular children's exhibit. It is always a great attraction for youngsters. The British Columbia Society of Model Engineers provided the mini-rail train rides and Gordon Hall attended with his Thomas and Friends children's exhibit. These are great children oriented exhibits, along with those of Vancouver Lego Club, Greater Vancouver Garden Railway Club, Canadian Toy Train Association, and Fraser Valley Autism.

There were, of course, serious modelling displays along with more whimsical and legacy exhibits. Vancouver Train Gang, Ingestre and Western, Pacific Northwest TT, Top Link Nettlewood, T-Track, and Victoria Model Railway Club displayed the art of modelling. Moscrop High School students' exhibits were a welcome demonstration of youth involvement. North Island Model Railroaders won the Modeller's Choice Award and Vancouver Lego Club won the Peoples' Choice Award.

As I will be "retiring" as Leader and from the Organizing Committee I thought it might be appropriate to review events during my twelve years with the train show. Perhaps you will find it interesting.

Trains 2013/14 31st/32nd Annual – 2014 Cameron Centre. **Burnaby - Attendance 2,500**

I joined the Trains Organizing Committee late summer 2013, the year I retired from formal work. This was a new committee, having formed earlier that year after the previous committee largely retired. The event was a combined two day Model Railway Exhibition public train show and Modellers Meet.



A few key members (Peter Mueller and Michael Batten), motivated by outgrowing the Cameron Centre with its limited access to the main exhibition area for large exhibits, advocated moving to a new and larger venue.

Vancouver Train Expo 2015 33rd Annual – PNE Forum – Attendance 4,500

The 33rd event saw the most significant changes in its history. While it continued the tradition of a combined public train show and modellers meet, it was re-branded as Vancouver Train Expo in the new venue. The Modellers' Meet was held at the Atrium Hotel across the street. The event was deemed a success even though the public event suffered a small loss (\$2,300).

It became apparent that organizing and holding a combined public train show and modellers' meet was unworkable. The increased size and complexity of the pubic event, along with the subsequent conflicting demands placed on the people available, hampered the growth of both. The modellers, who were often also the exhibitors, were forced to make a decision as to which event to attend.

A decision was made to separate the events. The result was the first Railway Modellers Meet of British Columbia (RMMBC) held in May 2016 followed by the public train show in November. RMMBC has held very successful events each year since.

Vancouver Train Expo 2016 34th Annual – PNE Forum – Attendance 5,040

Riding on the euphoria of successfully moving to a larger venue, 2016 started out with great enthusiasm. Soon, however, staging the 2016 event became a very serious challenge. Conflicting demands on committee members' time and health issues sapped the committee's capacity. For a number of months over late Spring and Summer I was the only one actively working on the event. Fortunately Michael Batten was able to reengage in the Fall. In the end it came off reasonably well with enough revenue to pay travel expenses and honoraria to exhibitors again while essentially breaking even financially.

Vancouver Train Expo 2017 35th Annual – PNE Forum – Attendance 5,950

Another year of major changes. I became the Leader. The Organizing Committee was rebuilt. Phil Evans joined the committee taking on the marketing role. The resulting Organizing Committee has remained stable since, with most of the members staying on into 2024, other than Michael Batten, one of the original 2013 committee, who retired at the end of the year. Don Thicke joined the committee as Business Manager early in 2018.



The re-branding effort continued with a new logo. Canadian Pacific's children's train, Little General, made an appearance. It was a great addition.

While attendance improved the event itself essentially broke even but incurred a loss of \$4,600 after paying exhibitor travel expenses and honoraria.

Up until this time the 7th Division acted as the legal entity for the public train show. Concerns over the growing size and related liabilities motivated the Division to request the public train show strike out on its own. The Lower Mainland Train Expo Society was incorporated under the BC Society's Act in February 2018.

As with all things, creating the Society increased the complexity. Canada Revenue Agency promptly sent notices informing us that we had to file returns and pay GST and Income Tax.

Discussion over the ownership of the public train show's financial assets led to an agreement between the Society and the Division which granted the public train show access to accumulated funds on the condition that all assets would be turned over to the Division in the event that a public train show ceased to be held.

Vancouver Train Expo 2018 36th Annual – PNE Forum – Attendance 5,590

An increase in admission fees, tighter control over costs and good attendance generated a good margin after paying exhibitor travel and honoraria, resulting in a substantial amount of money being retained to increase, by 60%, the working capital reserve.

Vancouver Train Expo 2019 37th Annual – PNE Forum – Attendance 6,400

Attendance improved again, reaching the highest level in the history of the event. The subsequent increase in revenue allowed an increase, nearly double, in honoraria to exhibitors and a significant increase (35%) in the retained cash reserve. There were wait lists for both exhibitors and vendor space.

2020-2022 The Pandemic Years

The COVID-19 pandemic intervened and the event was cancelled for three years.

Vancouver Train Expo 2023 38th - PNE Forum - Attendance 4,370

Restarting the event after a three year hiatus was challenging. Some of the exhibitors, notably Mainland Modular Railway Club had disbanded. Mount Rainier N Scale Club did not have sufficient members to attend. The furniture supplier had gone bankrupt. Fortunately the Organizing Committee remained intact.

Attendance fell to the lowest level since moving to the PNE. Costs rose substantially. The event broke even financially after paying exhibitor travel expenses and honoraria. This was only achieved by an increase in admission fees and the British Columbia Society of Model Engineers generously donating part of the revenue from their train ride to cover our shortfall.

Vancouver Train Expo 2024 39th – PNE Forum – Attendance 6,380

I have already commented extensively on this year's event. The increased revenue will allow an increase in exhibitor honoraria to almost triple last year's. The working capital reserve will increase to an amount sufficient to fully fund the event without any pre-show income.

The Future of Vancouver Train Expo

While the declining participation of exhibitors and vendors is disconcerting, the most serious challenge is renewing the Organizing Committee. For personal reasons I will not be continuing as the Leader nor as Committee member. Other committee members are resigning, including Phil Evans, Phil Breden and John Martin.

The Society will be kept in good standing pending renewal of the Organizing Committee and the election of new Directors and Officers.

Phil Evans, although not a modeller, has led the promotional aspect of the event. His knowledge and contacts built up over his career in the media (radio) have contributed greatly. He will be hard to replace as there are few in the model railway community with the requisite interest and skills.

The train show at this scale is a business venture which needs an Organizing Committee with sufficient combined organization, leadership, finance, risk (liability), legal, and promotion skills. The individuals must be inclined to take initiative and work co-cooperatively with others. They need to have the time to diligently attend to their responsibilities, and it does take time.

To be successful the Organizing Committee needs to successfully manage the two major aspects of a public event:

• Content – what people pay to see – exhibitors and vendors,

• Promotion / advertising – getting those people to come,


as well as the administrative and financial parts.

The event needs to appeal to, and attract, 5,000 plus attendees. Families with children are the only audience large enough to deliver these numbers, hence the content must appeal to this demographic.

In closing I thank all of the committee members who have worked with me, put up with my idiosyncrasies, countless e-mails and occasional prodding phone calls. All have performed their duties well, and most importantly, to me, worked constructively together to address the issues as they arose.
