Frank McKinney's Wheel

Many 7th Division members would be familiar with a small circular layout that is a regular part of Vancouver area train shows. The layout has a circle of track, is mounted at a slight angle, and is free to turn, with the result that a train running on the layout stays at the lowest side of the layout, while the layout scenery moves past it. Here is the story of the “wheel” and its builder.

Frank McKinney and the Wheel Layout

The “wheel” was designed and constructed by Frank McKinney for display at the “Totemland” NMRA National Convention held at the Hotel Vancouver on 25 to 29 August 1965. The NMRA Bulletin for July 1964 contained about three pages of promotional material on the convention. Earlier issues had also contained much similar material. Promotional items and articles on the convention appeared in the July-August 1964 issue and subsequent issues of the Dispatcher. The January-February 1965 issue contained over four pages of information on the convention. The cost of a single room at the Hotel Vancouver was \$10, a double \$14. The convention was briefly reported in the Vancouver Sun of 27 August, page 12, and 28 August, page 11. There were about 200 exhibits. The Province of 27 August, page 2, also contained a short article on the convention indicating that there were almost 900 registrants.

The 18-page convention Timetable ([accessible on the Internet](#)) indicates that Frank was in charge of “Transportation” on the convention committee. His transportation duties would have included arranging the bus trip tours to Vancouver Island, several Vancouver railway attractions, layout tours, and a trip up Grouse Mountain. The ‘Totemland Special’ was a 132-mile round trip CNR train ride from Vancouver to Boston Bar and return with lunch at Boston Bar and many stops along the way all for \$8.00. Frank also twice presented a clinic on modelling realistic trees, logs and stumps at the convention. The model exhibitors were not listed. The exhibits were open to the public on Saturday August 28, entrance fee: 50 cents and 25 cents for children. The over two and a half page report on the convention in the NMRA Bulletin for November 1965 heaped great praise on the event. The 933 registrants were a record for an NMRA convention. A total of 799 conventioners took the train trip to Boston Bar and back. They were greeted by a pipe band at Chilliwack. Similarly, the excursion to Vancouver Island attracted 400 participants. The public viewing was attended by 1228 persons.

Frank and his wife Jessie attended the “Railrodeo” annual convention of the NMRA which was held in Calgary, 15 to 21 July 1979. It is believed that they displayed the wheel. The Calgary Herald of 19 July, page B2, contained a short article and reported that there were 1,500 registrants.

The Vancouver Sun of 5 November 1982, page 24, noted that the public could visit the model railroad show at the Sheraton Villa hotel on Sunday (entrance \$5 for a family of three or more). It is believed that Frank displayed the wheel at this show.

Following Frank's death in 1985, members of the Nor-Wes Club based in North and West Vancouver took possession of the wheel and a number of his exquisite scratch-built structures. A number of members of the railroad club continued to maintain and display his wheel in subsequent years and, with the construction of a secure container about 1996, displayed it at annual train shows most years at Cameron Recreation Centre, and then at VTEX at the PNE Forum with time out for COVID.

Hank Menkveld, a well-known modeller, borrowed the wheel and displayed it at the Chilliwack Model Railroad show in the fall of 2001.

It is reported that an 0-4-0 tank steam engine, likely made by Mantua, was used as motive power in early years and that the engine finally toppled over as the flanges wore out. It was subsequently powered by a small brass United Ma & Pa 2-8-0 engine from Frank's layout. It has been powered in recent years by a LifeLike 0-4-0 tank engine won at a local model railroad banquet.

The overall diameter of the display is about 41 inches, and the track radius is about 17 inches. The speed of the engine and a tilt of the wheel of about 3½ degrees usually produces about four rotations of the wheel per minute. This translates to the engine travelling about 2150 feet (about one half a prototype mile) per hour. If we estimate that the wheel has operated about ninety seven-hour days in its life this would translate to a total distance of about 260 miles (415 kilometres). The track is hand-laid Code 100 rail with spikes pressed into the ties that Frank likely cut himself. The wooden ties appear to be glued to homosote board which, in turn, is glued to thin wooden splines bent to the circular shape and glued together.

A small well-used child's bicycle wheel provides the bearing for the structure to rotate. The source of the 35-lb. stand with its 16-inch diameter base is not known. It provides an excellent support, easily bolted to the wheel.

Frank McKinney: Builder of the Wheel Layout

Frank was a leading member of an early group of highly-skilled, Vancouver- area modellers. They were also enthusiastic promoters of the hobby. Apparently, he was also a skilled builder of doll houses as the Vancouver Sun of 9 November 1984 contains a photograph of Frank and his granddaughter in front of a doll house that he had made.

The BC Archives record the marriage of James Sinclair McKinney, age 34, a carpenter to Jean Gertrude Morrison, age 24, Frank's parents, at Mount Pleasant Presbyterian Church in Vancouver on 25 June 1913. James' parents had farmed near Kincardine in Ontario.

Franklin Scott McKinney, age 3, was recorded in the 1921 Census as living with his parents, James Sinclair, age 45, a farmer born in Ontario, and Jean Gertrude, age 33, born in PEI, and siblings Margaret Christine, age 6, and Robert James, age 5. They were recorded living in Delta.

The BC Archives record the death of James Sinclair McKinney, age 51, on 2 November 1928 at Vancouver. Frank would have been about 10 at that time.

Franklin Scott McKinney, age 13, a student, was recorded in the 1931 Census living with his mother, Jean Gertrude McKinney, born in Prince Edward Island, a widow and saleslady at a dry goods store, earning \$450 in the last year, and siblings Margaret C., age 17, Robert James, age 15, and Morrison Sinclair, age 9. They lived in a five-room wooden house which they owned, valued at \$1750, at 1789 E. 35th Ave in Vancouver. Google Streetview indicates that the house at that location is no longer present.

The Vancouver Sun in February 1936 contained a photograph of a “young sculptor in snow”, Frank McKinney, with an 11-foot ‘giant’ snow man which he had built in front of his home at 1789 East 35th Avenue in Vancouver. The caption mentioned the construction of a log cabin up Grouse Mountain and the carrying of a dismantled cast iron stove up the mountain.

Frank was a veteran of the Second World War, having served in Europe.

The Vancouver Sun recorded that Frank married Jessie in 1946. As well as being an insurance man and a modeller, Frank also manufactured wooden kits for another enthusiastic modeller, Spike Brown of Bordertown Publishing, who marketed them. It is recalled that he was a virtuoso with a table saw in manufacturing scale lumber. He disposed of the sawdust in his garden until his wife could say no more!

Voter’s lists for 1957, 1963, 1972, and 1974, accessible at the Ancestry website, indicate that Frank and Jessie lived at 442 West 23rd Avenue in North Vancouver, just across from Carson Graham High School. Frank’s occupation was sometimes listed as “insurance underwriter” or “underwriter”.

From the BC Vital Statistics website, we learn that Franklin Scott McKinney, son of James and Jean, born in Vancouver 31 March 1918, Insurance Underwriter, of 422 West 23 Ave., North Vancouver died on 9 July 1985. A brief death notice appeared in the Vancouver Sun of 11 July 1985, page 33. He was survived by his wife, Jessie, two sons and their wives and two grandchildren. It is recalled that that the 7th Division had scheduled a meet at Richmond on the day of the funeral. Many railway modellers took time out from the meet to attend his funeral at St. Andrews United Church in North Vancouver.

Jessie (1917-2017) continued to live in the area. The Vancouver Sun of 3 April 2017 recorded her death on 30 March 2017. She had outlived Frank by over 31 years.

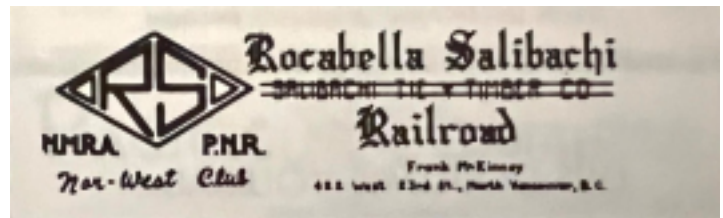
Frank and his Home Layout

Frank’s layout filled one end of a large recreation room in his home at 422 W 23rd Ave. in North Vancouver. It was what is now termed as a display layout, rather than a layout on which prototypical operation could be practised with a number of train operators, dispatchers, and so forth. The scenery was exquisite. The track was all hand laid. The wheel provides a sample of the quality. There were many scratch-built structures and innovative lighting effects, long before LEDs. The lighting effects included a moon rising and crossing across a darkened sky, a hobo’s campfire, etc. The Dispatcher of March-April 1962 contains an article with photograph regarding the driving of an extensively engraved “silver” last spike on his layout. That issue and some subsequent issues contained a business card as shown on the following page.

The same publication of January-February 1963 indicated that “Frank McKinney’s logging railway is complete. He painted his scenery using coloured slides taken up Howe Sound and Mount Baker for his ‘blueprint’. Works real nice, too. Howe Sound sure looks like the real thing.”

An article in the Vancouver Sun of 14 December 1975, pages 74 and 75, indicates that a tiny “gold” last spike was driven on his layout in 1962. The article indicated that he chose the road name of Rockabella Salibachi because he “liked the sound of it. Sounded like you were cussing something”. The change of name is not mentioned.

After Frank's death a portable switching module was constructed to display his structures and was taken to a number of meets. Two sections of his scenery were also converted into dioramas which were also displayed at a number of subsequent model railway events. Some of his structures later found their way to the layouts of other well-known layouts. His sawmill found its way to Anthony Craig’s layout in Burnaby and his scratch-built stone roundhouse is currently at Alan Trammel’s layout.

Frank and Railway Modelling of his Era

Many issues of the Dispatcher from at least March-April 1962 contained reports on the activities of the “Nor-Wes Club” (also sometimes called the “Nor-West Club”). Frank was a founding member and active member to his death. An item in the Dispatcher of March-April 1963 indicates that between 600 and 700 people had visited the layouts of members of the Nor-Wes Club to celebrate Model Railroad Week. An article in the Dispatcher of March-April 1964 announced the formation of a model railroad club called the “Lions’ Canyon Model Railroad Club”. Founding members included Frank McKinney. Apparently that name was short-lived. Several photographs of the Nor-Wes Club at model railroad events appear in other issues of the Dispatcher .

An article in the Vancouver Sun of 8 February 1966, page 3, marking “Model Railroad Week”, listed the dates and times with the addresses of a number of layouts in Vancouver which would be open to the public. Frank McKinney’s was included. Options of three dates were given for his layout. The Vancouver Sun of 14 February 1967, page 18, indicated that Norman Szun, president of the 7th Division of the NMRA, had announced Model Railroad Week would be marked by a display of models at the public library.

The Province of 21 October 1969, page 10, contained a photograph with caption of Frank McKinney and “the largest portable scale model railroad in North America” to be on display at the Oakridge Auditorium. It is recalled that the layout was also displayed at the PNE for a number of years.

A sizable article on model railroading was contained in the Vancouver Sun of 9 June 1972, page 86. It noted that Frank produced a number of accessories for sale to the hobby. The article contained a photograph of him and his layout. The article also included a photograph of the late Ken Davis overlooking his layout.

Footnote:

The Dispatcher was a small magazine published 1960 to 1965 focusing on the 7th Division of PNR NMRA. The editor was Spike Brown, a well-known Vancouver area modeller and an executive of Canfor, a large forest products company. After the Dispatcher ceased publication it was replaced, in a different format, as the 7th Division newsletter by the Bulletin Board.
