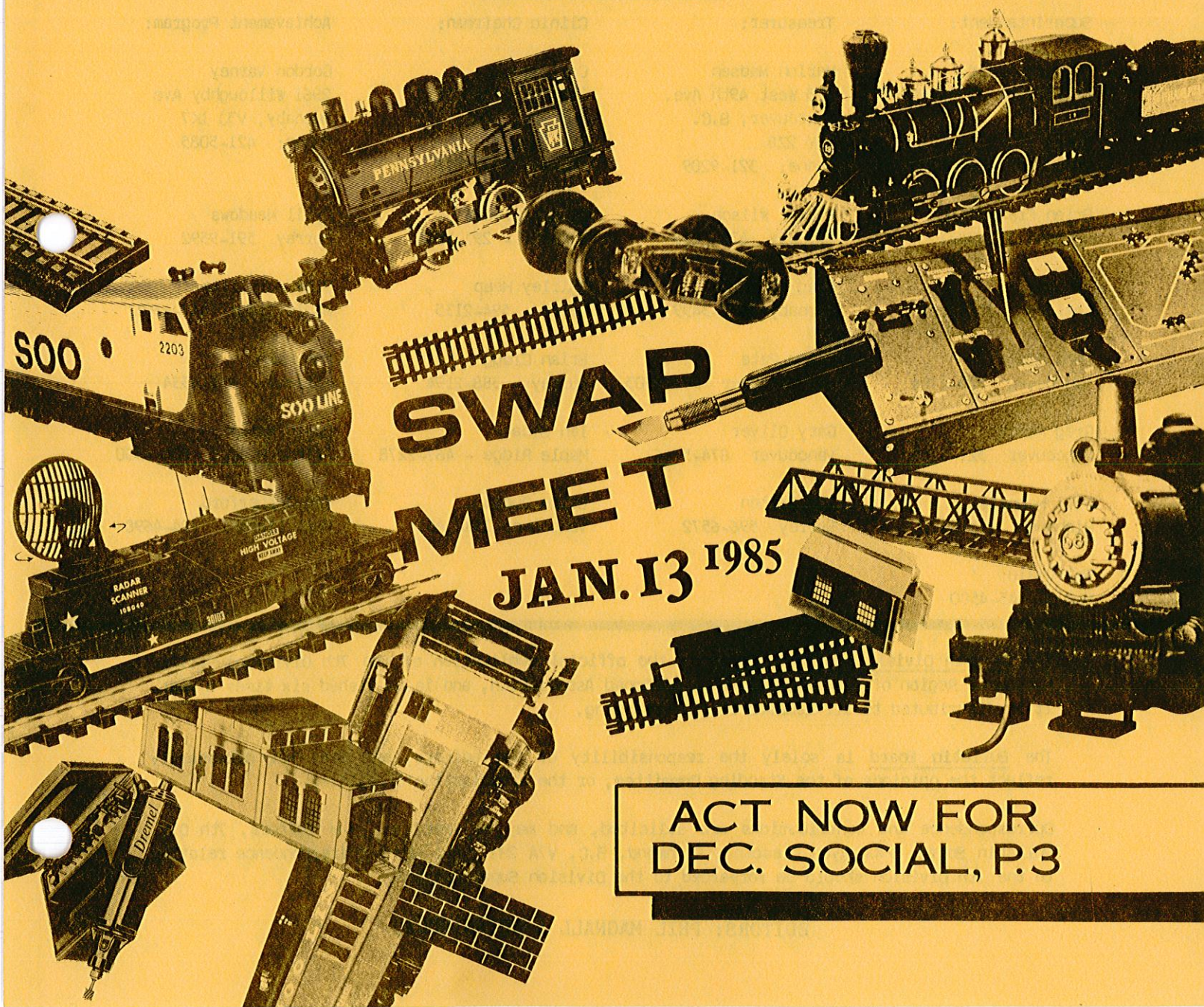

TRAINS '84: GOOD SHOW BUT A POOR DRAW

TRAINS '84 at Robson Square had everything: operating layouts, live steamers, contest-winning models, dioramas, modular railroading, a switching game, tabletop clinics, tinplate, and much more. Everything, that is, but people.

To look at the often shoulder-to-shoulder throng of visitors, one might have been hard pressed to suspect that the attendance was far below that which had been hoped for. According to 7th Division treasurer Marion Madsen, however, the final count was just over 1100, whereas as many as 4000 had been expected, resulting in but a fraction of the profit anticipated. Several veteran exhibitors remarked that although the November 11 show was being held at the city's newest and best-known centre, traffic and lack of free parking may have done more to dampen people's interest than did the steady rain that accompanied the day. With an eye on the success of the Richmond show held earlier this year, it was suggested that a more suburban setting might be chosen in 1985.

But whatever the crowd lacked in size, it made up for in spirit, with many individuals staying several hours to talk with hobbyists and store owners, watch demonstrations, or run trains. The 'Most Popular Model' and 'Most Popular Display' awards were participated in with enthusiasm, resulting in hundreds of votes cast, all of which had to be tallied between 4:55 and the time when displays started moving out the back door! The public's choice

in a model: Norm Starr's HO wooden trestle; for best display: the Top Link Model Railway Association's British layout, which had been an obvious crowd-pleaser all day. In fact, the verdicts surprised many modellers, but contest organizer Phil Magnall observed "I expected some surprises here. Had it been left up to the modellers alone to vote, I strongly suspect the results would have been different. Look at Brian Pate's national-winning water tower and grain elevator, or Brian Rudko's 'Rosebud Railroad' diorama. These are extremely high quality pieces of work, yet to John Q. Public I don't think they have the railroad feeling he has come to see. They might walk away with the awards at a spring meet, but here a complex wood trestle and a smoothly-operated working railway were more of what the folks wanted. We actually stopped counting display ballots three-quarters of the way through because the Top Link layout had such an insurmountable lead. I think there's a definite lesson to be learned about public shows: give them moving trains and traditional railroading."

It was, in fact, apparent that anything with sound or movement drew crowds whenever it was in operation: Hank Menkveld's 'scenic finishing' demonstrations, Tom Beaton's sound-equipped sawmill, the Dewdney-Alouette group's modules, the several tabletop clinics, Phil Magnall's O switching layout, and the tinsplate display were among the favourites. Static displays often seemed to lack supporting elements such as text, prototype information, or photos which might have made them more comprehensible to the uninitiated, but many fine models stood up well on their own nevertheless.

At the bottom line, Trains '84 has to be considered a success. It may not have met everyone's hopes, but it was attractive, well-organized, and very much enjoyed by the hundreds who came to see it.

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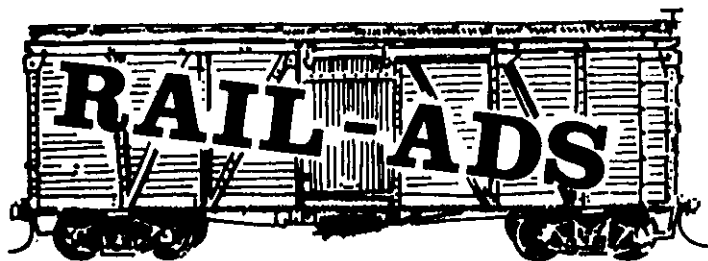

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PNR NEWS

N-CON RECEIVED N-THUSIASTICALLY

Vancouver's first N scale convention was held on October 28 at the YMCA Cloverly Centre in North Vancouver. The chief intent of the convention was to promote the work currently being done in N scale, and to ensure that more N scalers could meet each other.

The accent was on building: Kalmbach "how-to" videos, many clinics on technique, and Ntrak on-the-spot construction. There were a number of static displays as well, featuring kitbashed items and a number of excellent scratchbuilt structures. Six of the current Kalmbach videos (obtained from Creative Hobbycraft) were very popular, and were shown on a continuous basis. Ten clinics were presented, ranging from the advantages of European prototype to traction modelling under operating overhead. How-to-do-it clinics included scenery with ground foam, kitbashing tools and techniques, structure kitbashing, and locomotive repairs. Three rooms were utilized,

allowing three different activities to be conducted simultaneously. Thanks to the YMCA for exemplary cooperation. The registered total of 92 did not include the clinicians, organizers, or hangers-on. The registrants were eligible for door prizes which were graciously donated by Creative Hobbycraft, Gary's Trains, Pacific N Scale and Van Hobbies - our thanks to these firms. The PNR also received the benefit of seven new members signing up, one of whom won a display prepared by Phil Magnall of the membership committee. This event returned \$50 to the PNR treasury without the need for up-front capital. As N-Con '84 seems to have been a considerable success, we are looking forward to a similar event in 1985.

TECHNIQUE

RHOPLEX: A CHEAPER & BETTER BONDING MEDIUM

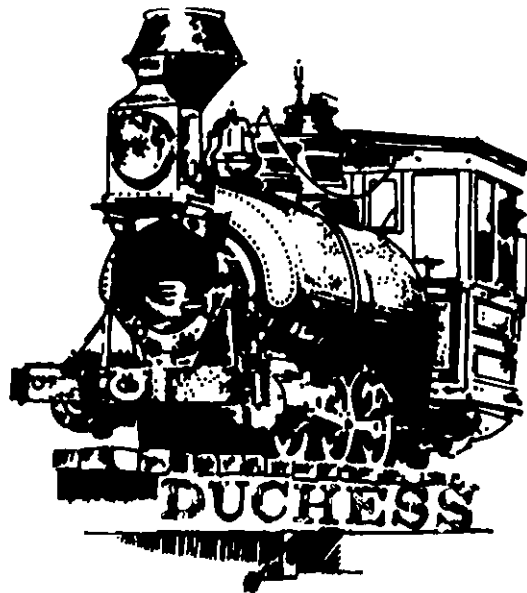
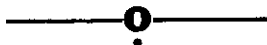
Most model railroaders are probably familiar with the use of white glue, such as Elmer's or Bondfast, to bond track ballast and scenic materials to roadbed and landscape. An alternative material often touted in books and magazines is "acrylic matte medium", but those who have hunted up the product at an art supply store have usually been deterred from trying it out by the high cost of the little bottles marketed by such big names as Grumbacher. Unfortunately, most art store staff seem unwilling or unaware when it comes to the promotion of a locally manufactured product known as Rhoplex, which is an extremely effective and economical alternative. A one litre plastic bottle costs about \$7.50, and can be diluted as much as 100% with water. At this rate, it can even cost less than white glue, and has several advantages over it as well.

First, it seems to dry more quickly than white glue; those who have worked with acrylic paints will be familiar with their rapid drying time. It also remains a very effective adhesive when thinned to a much greater degree than that at which white glue becomes too weak, making it easier to use in bonding large areas of earth or grass materials. Thirdly, it remains somewhat flexible, and thus, reportedly, more sound absorbent when used on ballast, and lastly, even when applied heavily, it will always dry to a dead

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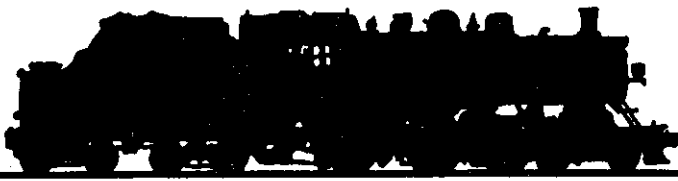


The Duchess was one of British Columbia's pioneer locomotives. She was one of a pair built by Baldwin for service on the Wellington Colliery Rwy. in 1978. This line ran from Wellington to Departure Bay (near Nanaimo). Apparently the engines were originally delivered as 30" gauge, and were later converted to 3' gauge. The Duchess still exists and is on display in Carcross in the Yukon.
