PNR 2024 Convention Status Report

The Surrey Excursion Convention will take place May 22-26, 2024, and be held at the Sheraton Guildford Hotel in Surrey, British Columbia.

We are now in the second stage of registration, with full fare registration costing \$149. This rate will expire midnight March 31. The registration rate will then increase to \$169. Act fast to take advantage of the second stage. Thank you to all who took advantage of the first stage and registered early.

Registration pricing gives access to self-guided layout tours, contests, displays, achievement program (AP) evaluation, clinics, operation sessions, and in-house non-rail activities. All clinics, display/contest, banquet, and non-rail rooms will be located on the second floor of the hotel and may be accessed by elevators.

We have 50 clinics arranged for Thursday, Friday, and Saturday. Please take a look at the [convention website](#) as the topics and brief descriptions are being continually added under the Clinic tab. There are still a handful of Deluxe King rooms available for \$185 plus taxes per night and Club rooms for \$225 plus taxes per night.

Three Interesting Books

These three books are all fairly recently published and all have topics related to BC railways, but have quite different approaches and styles.

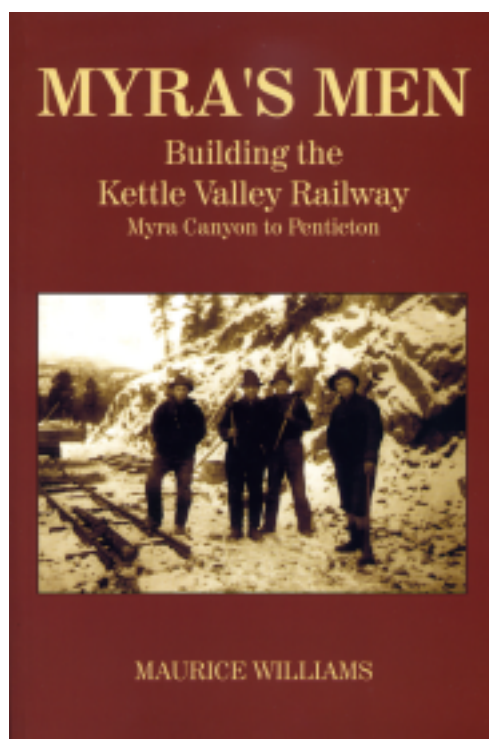
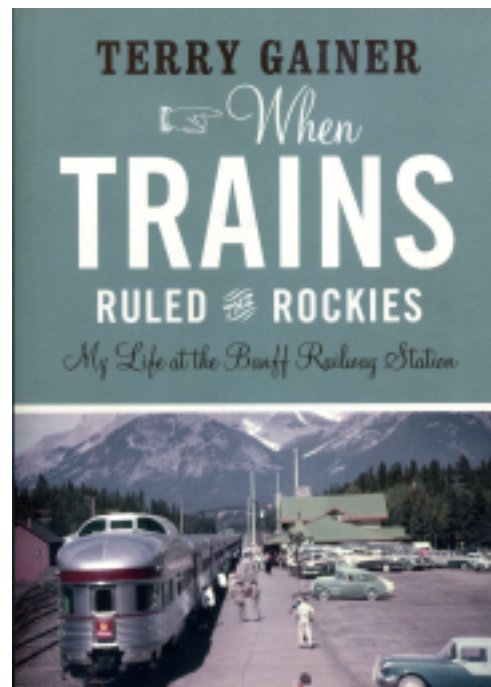
Growing Up in Banff Station

When Trains Ruled the Rockies – My Life at the Banff Railway Station. By Terry Gainer; Rocky Mountain Books; 2019; 252 pages; \$22.

This book's author had the good fortune of being the son of the Banff Stationmaster, and thus grew up in an apartment on the second floor of Banff station through the late forties, fifties and early sixties. The book is small in size, about the size of a classic paperback novel. The included photos are rather small, but are well reproduced.

The story covers the full range of everyday details of the life of a young boy (including rather more than I really wanted to know about childhood rivalries and local fishing holes), but also provides a very interesting view of the railway activities associated with a medium sized station. The author describes his interactions with the telegraph operators, the local switching crew, the baggage handlers and passenger train crews, as well as describing the work of the local town people, businesses and tourist facilities and their interaction with the station.

I enjoyed this book. It is well written and tells a story that has not been told before. There is probably not a lot of content that could translate directly into models, unless you happened to be modelling Banff station in the fifties, but there is a lot of interesting background information. This includes fascinating details about what went on in a busy station or small town in the fifties, and the book's information on late CPR passenger trains. The fact that the period covered by this book is commonly modelled is also a plus. The small size of the book's photos is a slight negative, but does not severely detract from the book. I purchased my copy at a local bookstore.



Building the KVR Through Myra Canyon

Myra's Men – Building the Kettle Valley Railway, Myra Canyon to Penticton. By Maurice Williams; Myra Canyon Trestle Restoration Society; 2008; 168 pages; \$20.

This book covers an aspect of the Kettle Valley Railway (KVR) that has only been touched on before: the lives of the workers who built the line and the conditions under which they worked. The book has what could be seen as a rather narrow focus and it was written by an academic historian, which some may take as a warning, but I did not find it a difficult book to read.

The book starts with an overview of the early history of the KVR and introduces the people, such as Andrew McCullough, involved in its design and construction. It then focuses in on the problem posed for the line by the Myra Canyon and the solution chosen for the line's construction. Next it describes the building of the Myra Canyon section

of the line, the hiring of the workers, the camps in which they lived, the dangers they faced, and what they did in their free time. As one might expect, it did not sound like a job I would like to work at. The book is well illustrated with photos from various archives and museums, and contains a large amount of footnotes, tables and other reference materials.

I found the book interesting and well written, with all content well supported. Given the rarity of models of railways under construction, it is unlikely that many would find this book a good source of modelling support material. It does provide detailed information on the Myra Canyon bridges that some might find useful. On a more general level, it does cover an aspect of the construction of the KVR that is not strongly covered elsewhere, as well as providing broader information on the treatment of workers in the first world war era. Would I recommend it? Yes, for someone particularly interested in KVR history and who has already read Barrie Sanford's excellent history *McCulloch's Wonder* or a similar book.

The book may be a little hard to find. I bought my copy at the Revelstoke Railway Museum. You may be able to get your local bookstore to order it in for you.

Railway Heritage in BC

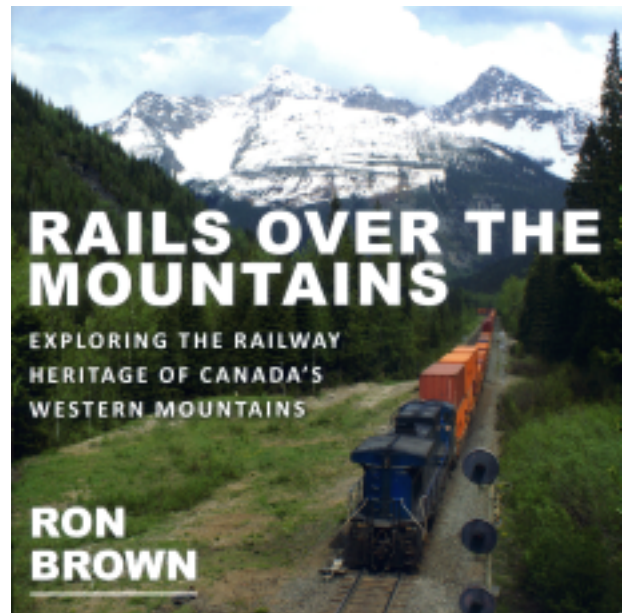
Rails Over The Mountains – Exploring the Railway Heritage of Canada's Western Mountains. By Ron Brown; Dundurn; 2016; 156 pages; \$30.

This book has an interesting focus: rather than providing a history related to BC railways, it provides descriptions of BC railway-related heritage sites, buildings, museums, etc. This provides something different than most railway books, but has the disadvantage of going out-of-date as things change.

The book starts with a general overview of BC railway history, and then provides chapters on tunnels and bridges, railway stations, railway towns, railway hotels, railway structures, railway museums, railway trails and railway rides. This way of organizing the content has the effect of causing some duplication as there is a certain amount of overlap between railway towns, railway stations and railway museums, and so forth. Each of the chapters provides a list of content items (i.e., towns, hotels, etc) with anything between a paragraph to one or two pages on each. The text provides a description of why the item is important, what can be seen there, followed by its current status. The book is illustrated with black and white photos.

One problem I noticed with the book is that the item descriptions often contain errors. For example, the Esquimalt naval base is described as being "former" and as being "across the harbour from Victoria". Neither is true. This kind of error probably wouldn't cause problems for most users, but it does reduce confidence in the amount of fact checking that was done.

I found the many small errors in the book to be annoying, but I also found there were descriptions of several heritage items that I wasn't aware of, even though I tend to think of myself as being quite well informed about BC's railway heritage. I also found that a few of the heritage item descriptions were now out of date. All in all, I would hesitate to recommend this book without knowing more about the potential reader. It might not be an appropriate book for a well-informed reader, but could be quite helpful for someone who is newer to the hobby, particularly if he or she is willing to do a bit of online checking before heading off to see something.

Obituary

John Klit of Trail BC passed away on October 21, 2023 at the age of 87 years. John has left behind his wife Joan, six children, 21 grandchildren, and 17 great-grandchildren (with one more on the way), as well as many other family members and friends.

John was born in Trail on November 22, 1935. After finishing school, he spent the majority of his working career at Cominco. He worked there for almost 40 years, retiring in 1992. He then spent time at Woodbury Resort on Kootenay Lake fishing and helping develop the campground.

John was a very creative man and in 1961 he began the life-long project of building his own home. John was also a proud member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles for 52 years. As an active member, he held many positions and was awarded for many of his achievements.

John was a passionate railway modeller with a large, free-lance, HO scale layout that took up a good portion of the basement of his home. He was a long-time member of the 7th Division, as well as a member of the Golden City Railway Modellers. Club members report that he was a quiet, very likeable man.
